FACULTY/STAFF

Tara Niendam, Ph.D.

Associate Professor of Psychiatry
Executive Director, UC Davis Early Psychosis Programs

Dr. Niendam is a licensed clinical psychologist with specialized training in psychodiagnostic and cognitive assessment in youth at-risk for or in the early stages of psychosis. She is the co-Investigator of the HRSA-funded pre-doctoral Trauma and Adolescent Mental Illness internship, a collaboration with the UC Davis CAARE Center to provide evidence-based trauma informed care to youth with early psychosis. In her research, Dr. Niendam is interested in understanding how deficits in cognition can influence an individual's ability to maintain age-appropriate social and work/school functioning, as well as how the use of smartphones can improve clinical care for youth with psychosis.

Cameron S. Carter, M.D.

C. Bryan Cameron Presidential Chair in Neuroscience
Director, Behavioral Health Center of Excellence

Dr. Carter is a distinguished professor of psychiatry and psychology directs the EDAPT Clinic. He has been conducting basic, clinical and translational research using neuroimaging tools for more than 25 years.

Tyler A. Lesh, Ph.D.

Associate Project Scientist
Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences

Dr. Lesh is a licensed clinical psychologist and studies the cognitive and neural mechanisms that underlie schizophrenia and bipolar disorder, using brain imaging techniques. His recent research focuses on how cannabis use may impact individuals with psychosis and their cognition and immune function. He was recently awarded a State of California Bureau of Cannabis Control grant to examine the effects of cannabis use in adolescents and young adults with psychosis.

Daniel I. Shapiro, Ph.D.

Assistant Professor of Psychiatry
Director of Operations, UC Davis Early Psychosis Programs

Dr. Shapiro specializes in the identification and treatment of those at-risk for or in the early stages of psychosis. He also has clinical and teaching expertise in cognitive behavioral therapy, particularly for mood, anxiety, psychosis, and trauma-related concerns in adults and adolescents. His research focuses on treatments for serious mental illness and on individual and cultural factors that affect the decisions people make about treatment.

Medical Director, UC Davis Early Psychosis Programs

Dr. Wadell is a child and adolescent psychiatrist and the associate program director for the Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Fellowship. She provides psychiatric care for children and young adults. Dr. Wadell's interests include preventive care, mental health policy and education.

Ms. Glassman serves as the SacEDAPT Clinic Family Advocate. With a background in public education and a personal experience living with a family member with a mental illness diagnosis, she brings a unique perspective to family advocacy.
